

MIDTESOL 2021: Paradigm Shift in ELT Education: Forging an Educational Framework for a Post-Pandemic World


The pandemic continues to shape our lives and teaching, but it can't squelch our inspiration! MIDTESOL 2021, MIDTESOL's **second** virtual conference, took place on October 22-23 with a wide range of quality conference activities, despite the constraints of being online. This conference featured conference artwork specially prepared for MIDTESOL by artist Tiffany Hovendick, a welcome video, 60 pre-recorded and live presentations, Interest Section coffee chats, exhibitor showcases, prizes, the MIDTESOL annual Business Meeting, and a Happy Hour with craft mocktails for each state custom-designed in consultation with a professional mixologist. Keynote speakers Yangsook Choi (children's book author and illustrator, an ELL herself) and Latrice Lyle (anti-racism consultant) pushed the boundaries of our understanding the experiences of our diverse students. Featured speakers Sharon Tjaden-Glass and Sara Stevick (instructional media designers) and Terrell Hawkins of the US Department of State English Language Fellows Program helped us explore various means of using our English teaching skills in alternative professional settings. Long-time MIDTESOL friend Roger Rosenthal of the Migrant Legal Action Program brought us up-to-date on the latest immigration law reforms that are likely to impact our students. Various exhibitors provided workshops. And MOST IMPORTANTLY, members of MIDTESOL from across the organization's interest sections (K-12, IEP, Adult Ed/Community College, Teacher Training, Program Administrators, Ed Tech) helped enrich our perspectives and our teaching ideas with their own presentations. Thank you to all who participated or presented! And a special thanks to the Conference Committee and especially to the Conference Tech Team for handling the Crowd Compass conference app support, proposal and scheduling technology, presentation video management, and day-of-the conference attendee and presenter tech support.

If you registered for the conference, remember that you have access through the Crowd Compass app to recordings of most of the sessions (both pre-recorded and recorded on the day of the conference); simply open the conference schedule from the "Schedule" link in the left-hand menu of Crowd Compass and you will see Youtube videos of each recorded presentation above the description of the session. From the Secretary

I have had the honor of serving as Secretary of MIDTESOL from 2019-2021. To conclude my tenure as MIDTESOL Secretary, I would like to share some of the highlights from the 2021 Annual Business Meeting that took place on the first day of the MIDTESOL Conference on October 22, 2021.

Second, if you were unable to attend, here are some key highlights from the meeting. The beginning of the meeting was facilitated by 2020-21 President Kelly McClendon who shared the following information:

- **MIDTESOL Mission Statement Currently Being Revised:** An ad hoc committee is currently revising the MIDTESOL Mission Statement and key values with input from MIDTESOL members through a series Coffee Chats. The proposed revisions are still pending final approval. Key values proposed by the committee were related to advocacy, lifelong learning, professionalism, and respect. Please watch for future notices about the revised mission statement and key values.
- **MIDTESOL's Commitment to Excellence:** Attendees were reminded of MIDTESOL's commitment to excellence in providing high quality professional development; advocacy at the local, national, and global levels; and the importance of incentivizing membership through member benefits.
- **2021 MIDTESOL Highlights:** Some key 2021 key highlights included publication of the MIDTESOL Journal (4th Volume), coffee hours, MIDTESOL representation at the TESOL Advocacy Summit, the first online MIDTESOL social gathering during the TESOL Conference, and committee work to revise the mission statement, key values, and MIDTESOL logo.
- **Social Media and Membership Data:** Attendees reviewed MIDTESOL Social Media data over the past four years as well as trends in membership numbers by type and location. Membership included a mix of people from the four MIDTESOL states as well as others outside of the four MIDTESOL states. It was noted that membership numbers have decreased during the pandemic.
- **Operating Budget:** MIDTESOL is currently in good financial standing!

- **Awards:** MIDTESOL offers a variety of awards including travel awards to the annual MIDTESOL Conference, TESOL Advocacy Summit, and the TESOL Convention. They are also essay awards for adults and K-12 students.
- **Immeasurable Thanks Extended to the 2021 Conference Committee:** Special thanks were extended to the 2021 MIDTESOL Conference Committee including Vicki Anderson (Conference Chair), Program Chair (Aimee Leisy), Zachary Smith (Exhibitor Coordinator) and other contributing members (Sue Almén-Whittaker, Liza Armstrong, Lynn Tiemann, Terry Barakat, Shaeley Santiago, Lindsey Simanowitz). With the support of the committee, the MIDTESOL 2021 was a huge success. In addition, thanks was extended to conference sponsors and exhibitors.

The second half of the meeting began by inducting the new 2021-22 MIDTESOL President Kaylene Sasse. Following the induction, Kaylene facilitated the remainder of the meeting.

- **Induction of the New President for 2021-2022:** Kayleen Sasse was inducted and introduced herself. Kaylene shared two key goals for this year: To increase membership, and to help transition to MIDTESOL's next stage (e.g., hybrid or in-person conference). Kaylene also shared how important it was to "embrace ambiguity", a guiding statement she has carried with her from a mentor in Mainland China. In other words, Kaylene believes we have to be flexible and embrace what lies ahead. Kelly added: "I think if anything....our field is full of flexible professionals and brave students."
- **2021-22 Election Results Announced:**
 - Vice President: Zachary Smith, Des Moines Public Schools
 - Secretary: Hilal Ergül, University of Northern Iowa
 - Kansas At Large: Cara Codney, Emporia State University
- **2021-22 Board Officers, Board Members, Interest Sections Leaders, and 2022 and 2023 Future Conference Committee Chairs** were also shared. Members are encouraged to reach out to Members-at Large with state-level issues. Also, a Missouri Member-At-Large will be voted in soon.
- **Thanks for Officers Who Have Finished Their Terms:** Thanks also extended to Shaeley Santiago, Thu Tran, and Janet Hiatt who have finished their terms as MIDTESOL Officers.
- **Giveaways:** Sue Almén-Whittaker was the lucky conference winner of keynote speaker Yangsook Choi's art work!
- **Save the Date for TESOL 2022 in Pittsburg, PA from March 22-25, 2022:** Watch for details about the MIDTESOL gathering at the conference. It will be hosted by Zachary Smith, 2021-22 MIDTESOL Vice President.
- **2022 MIDTESOL Conference:** Stay tuned for more details about the 2022 MIDTESOL Conference at the Intercontinental in Kansas City. The conference committee is tentatively planning both in-person and virtual components for next fall's conference.

It has been an honor to serve as MIDTESOL Secretary to both document meetings and provide a voice of advocacy for multilingual learners and families, as well as educators in MIDTESOL states. I will continue as a MIDTESOL member and wish the best to 2021-22 MIDTESOL leaders and members.

Members-At-Large State News

State Update: Iowa by Cindra Porter

Innovation and adaptation have been guiding words for educators in the past two years. The world may imagine the challenges faced by educators during this time in history, but those of us living the experience know that each challenge often creates both new issues and opportunities to meet the needs of our students who are learning and acquiring the English language.

IOWA

It was disappointing to hear that no Iowa institutions of higher education were awarded funds this fall for the 2021 USDE National Professional Development grant. New opportunities to reinforce college and university ESL endorsement programs may come from a new form of collaboration, however, between institutions of higher education and state area education agencies.


Iowa AEAs (Area Education Agencies) are exploring potential partnerships with institutions of higher education to encourage and support graduate level coursework around the area of English Language Education for educators in K-12 settings. Graduate coursework may be applied toward an ESL endorsement at the discretion of the student, but also may be a professional development option for content area teachers who want to learn more about supporting multilingual students in their schools.

These new partnerships may benefit college and university ESL programs by increasing program enrollment. K-12 schools who search for new or additional ESL teachers currently face a limited hiring pool. An approach to recruiting new ESL teachers from within a school's current faculty population offers one possible way to meet ESL faculty spaces in both urban and rural school districts.

The introduction of weighted funding for two categories of English Learners in Iowa has acknowledged the additional time and resources necessary to support language acquisition in our K-12 schools. [This Fiscal Note](#) from the Legislative Services Agency further describes weighted funding for English Learners which was applied for the first time in October of this year.

The Iowa Seal of Biliteracy continues to provide a reminder that multilingualism is valued in our state. The current report from 2020 may be found in [The Iowa Condition of Education Report](#). The Iowa Department of Education states that the most current report will be updated and published soon on the Iowa DE site.

As communication and collaboration grows between K-12 ESL programs and language programs in higher education, the state of Iowa will develop a better understanding of the needs of our newest residents who call Iowa their new home. Despite the challenges in teaching through a pandemic, filling teaching positions, and supporting our students studying English in the U.S., the collaboration among all fields of language education in the state of Iowa affirm that multilingualism is valued for our students and for our state's future.
